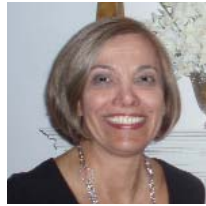

A new law is now in effect to help protect persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The law established a Central Registry of Offenders against Individuals with Developmental Disabilities, maintained by the state Department of Human Services (DHS). Employees or volunteers of programs (such as programs of The Arc of Monmouth) that receive any state funding who are found to have abused, neglected or exploited a person with a developmental disability will be added to the registry. Those on the registry may not work or volunteer at any program or facility funded by DHS. The law also includes penalties for persons who fail to report an instance of alleged abuse, neglect or exploitation of a person with developmental disabilities. This law will prevent employees who are found to have abused a person in one agency from moving to a similar job in another agency. We appreciate the New Jersey legislature's efforts through this bill to protect our served individuals from persons with a history of abuse, neglect or exploitation.

We also need the help of our officials and legislators to protect the funding for services for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Cuts to funding made in the last two years make operation of services and supports a struggle. It is very hard to raise funds to cover deficits in funding for services such as vocational training and transportation. These services are very valuable to the persons who use them. Please support our efforts to advocate that there be no additional cuts in the upcoming fiscal year (FY 2012). Write a letter, email, or speak with your state legislators and tell them you want "No budget cuts for people with developmental disabilities in FY 2012". Your voice matters.

Raising worms first began as a green project introduced by James Brown of the Monmouth County Planning Board Recycling Program to the WOC Self Advocacy Group. This was a very well-received program as everyone involved really enjoyed caring for the worms, and watching them evolve.

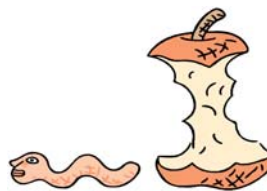
Through research, Director of Vocational Services Linda Porter learned that worms are valuable for their castings (waste) as well as aerating soil. With so many gardeners in the area, staff at WOC agreed that the sale of worms would be a wonderful way to raise additional funds for WOC.

Green projects and gardening are not new to WOC. This past summer, individuals from WOC were very involved in the Seventh Avenue Community Garden in Long Branch as part of their volunteer work in the community. The individuals enjoyed going there every week, and even brought some of their original worms to donate to the garden. Unfortunately they were not worms that could survive a New Jersey winter, and the worms came back to WOC in early December. Once WOC has established an earthworm community that can survive our harsh winters, they will donate some to the garden to take up residence there and help the garden thrive.

Donations are being sought to get WOC's Worm Farm up and running. The cost for two farms is \$334. 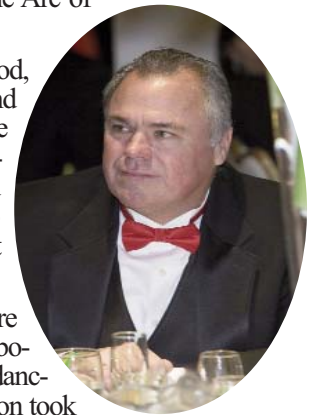
A Shining Success at 44th Annual Winter Glow Ball

Keep Achieving (Kach) at Brookdale Community College

In late September 2010, six recent high school graduates with intellectual and developmental disabilities walked onto the Brookdale Community College campus as continuing education college students. Arc's collaborative endeavor with Brookdale's Outreach, Business & Community Development, known as Keep Achieving (Kach) at Brookdale, was officially launched. In partnership, The Arc and Brookdale have planned a college experience for six individuals per year for three years.

The project, partially funded by a grant through The Arc of the United States from the Walmart Foundation, provides valuable experiential learning at the college and in the community. Eighteen individuals will participate over a three-year period.

The Arc of Monmouth and Brookdale Community College have identified five areas of need for transitioning students into

the community: self-determination; employment or volunteer opportunities; post secondary education and vocational training; involvement in the community, including social and civic affairs. Peer mentors will assist students during individual classes, employment internships, navigating

the campuses and participating in student activities. The overall goal of Kach is for students to gain the skills and confidence they need to succeed in their chosen field, in a paid or volunteer position.

Understanding Guardianship for Adults With Developmental Disabilities

AS A PARENT, AM I AUTOMATICALLY THE GUARDIAN FOR MY ADULT SON OR DAUGHTER WITH A DISABILITY?

No. At the age of majority – 18 in New Jersey and 21 in Pennsylvania – the law considers a child emancipated, regardless of the severity of the disability. Only a judge can appoint a guardian for a person over the age of majority.

HOW DO I BECOME MY CHILD'S GUARDIAN?

A parent must initiate a fairly simple court proceeding order to be designated guardian. This can be done prior to age 18, or at any time after that.

WHAT DOES A GUARDIAN DO?

The guardian makes all decisions about the care and treatment of the person under guardianship, who is referred to as a ward. For example, the guardian may decide whether to consent to surgery, or to a change of placement, such as from an institution to a group home. The guardian often attends the IEP or IHP meetings and decides whether to consent to the plan of services. The guardian may also decide on the best way to protect the legal rights of the ward. For instance, if the guardian were dissatisfied with the services an agency provides to the ward, the guardian would have authority to challenge that decision.

The guardian may also make all decisions about the property of the person under guardianship, unless that property is in trust or consists of social security benefits. In these cases it is the trustee and representative payee respectively who would decide what to do with this property. A guardian does not assume financial responsibility for the ward.

WHAT IF MY CHILD NEEDS A GUARDIAN FOR SOME DECISIONS, BUT NOT OTHERS?

Both New Jersey and Pennsylvania have passed legislation allowing for limited guardianship.

This allows a guardian to make decisions in some, but not all, areas of an individual's life. For instance, parents may be appointed limited guardians of their son with respect to financial and medical issues. In such a case, personal decisions such as where to work or live will remain with the individual. As a result, limited guardianship can take on many forms and can be tailored to match an individual's strengths and weaknesses. While many people with very severe cognitive disabilities may still require a "full" guardian, a limited guardian may be appropriate for someone who is "higher functioning" or who has a very "mild" cognitive impairment. Experienced attorneys and psychologists can assist families in deciding which form of guardianship may be appropriate.

WHO SHOULD SERVE AS GUARDIAN?

A guardian is the ward's chief advocate, so he or she should have an interest in the person with a disability and be willing to take the time

to learn about the person's needs. Ideally, the person selected as a guardian should live close to the ward. The guardian should also know where to turn for professional help in making decisions. Most often, it is the parents who become guardians when a person with a disability reaches the age of majority. Parents will need to consider a successor guardian who can serve as guardian when they are no longer able to do so.

CAN A PARENT DESIGNATE A SUCCESSOR GUARDIAN THOUGH A WILL?

Yes. We advise parents to appoint successor guardians in their will, even if they are not yet court-appointed guardians because the provision would take effect. Additionally, it is always a good idea to designate a primary successor guardian, and then one or two other successors to serve in the event that the primary successor is unable to complete his duties.

WHAT IF THERE IS NO ONE ELSE WHO CAN SERVE AS A SUCCESSOR GUARDIAN?

There are several options available. The State may become a person's guardian if no one else is available, however, this should be used only as a last resort. Instead, consideration should be given to using a community trust organization such as PLAN/NJ or PLAN of Pennsylvania. Such services can be funded from a properly established trust for the benefit of the individual with disabilities.

IS IT EXPENSIVE TO OBTAIN GUARDIANSHIP?

Guardianship is relatively inexpensive and easy to obtain privately with the assistance of an experienced attorney. Procedures sometimes vary by county, and this may affect the cost. Generally, however, courts try to streamline the process in cases in which the child's disability is clear.

In New Jersey, if your child receives services from the Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD), it may be possible to obtain guardianship at no cost. However, DDD can take several years to reach your child's case. A private attorney can use special procedures to streamline guardianships for DDD clients.
